TRIBUTE TO RAY AND DOMI SMITH

Long time board member Ray Smith and his wife Domi Smith were honored at this year's annual MCA meeting in May at the Natural History Museum. Dr. Smith, or "The Mayor of Mission Canyon" as we like to call him, has been involved in MCA for decades, and was instrumental in helping get the first Community Wildfire Protection Plan adopted by the Board of Supervisors. He served as President of MCA and pretty much every other position you can think of – from sitting down every month with the current Supervisor to advocate for Mission Canyon to installing and then refilling Mutt Mitts to keep our canyon as beautiful as possible.

TUNNEL TRAIL & MISSION CREEK UPDATE

Tragically, over four years after Southern California Edison severely damaged Tunnel Trail and portions of Mission Creek we are still dealing with the fallout of their negligence.

As we all know, Tunnel Trail has been closed for the past few months so SCE could do habitat restoration work which was required by the SB County District Attorney's office and other regulatory agencies, including removing much of the side cast they had dumped over the side of the trail into the Mission Creek watershed, impacting wildlife native plants and wildlife habitat and trail aesthetics. As they finished this year's work there was a week or so of intermittent helicopter activity between October 7th and 18th to remove debris from a portion of the Creek where work by hand is being done and which is inaccessible to trucks. Seeding and planting native plants will continue after the trail is reopened.

Unfortunately, SCE has recently informed us that they will not be able to finish the work this year because they are not allowed to do work in an actively flowing creek, so they will have to re-close the trail, likely next summer, to finish required work in the creek itself. Your Mission Canyon Association will work with SCE to make sure the trail is not closed any longer than necessary and to ensure the required

work is done to the highest standards.

MCA negotiated community compensation from Edison to make trailhead and Tunnel Road improvements. We are working with both the City and County to implement plans to improve traffic safety for pedestrians, bikers, and cars once the trail reopens. Improvements include evacuation planning with the expected expansion (cont. P. 2) of the turnaround at the trailhead near the City Water tank so that vehicles can turn around without having

to make a three-point turn. This will also create more maneuverability for fire trucks.

In addition, we are working to remove vegetation that may be blocking the line of sight to improve safety for vehicles and pedestrians as well as working with the County to make sure trail users are only parking in designated parking spaces.

UPDATE FROM THE SANTA BARBARA BOTANIC GARDEN

Happy autumn from the Botanic Garden! Our Fall planting season is rapidly approaching along with cooling weather and shorter days. Our Members' sale on Friday, November 8th is currently open for free registrations: Member Exclusive: Fall Planting Kick Off - Santa Barbara Botanic Garden (sbbotanicgarden.org) to book a parking spot and an hour of shopping. Quick update on our newest hiking trail. The Tipton Trail (named in honor of the J.E. and Lillian Tipton Foundation, which provided the funds to purchase the land east of the Pritzlaff Conservation Center) is slated to open to the public on National Hiking Day, Sunday, November 17th. Our new foot bridge across a tributary of Rattlesnake Creek is currently being installed by SAGE Trail Alliance, a non-profit partner that cut-in the trail this summer. This trail is a 1.15-mile out and back, with an average slope of 12.5%, and total elevation gain of 329 feet. At the 873-foot summit, one can take in amazing views of the northern Channel Islands, places where the Garden has done important conservation work for several decades, preserving some of California's rarest and most fantastic plants. We are excited to launch this trail which will bring the Garden's trail network up past 5 miles, in addition to our beautiful floral displays organized into habitat Sections across our 78 acres



Bridge stringers getting put into place this past week. Planking is currently being installed and additional trail maintenance and tree work will begin shortly thereafter. The Garden is turning 100 in March 2026! We will plan on announcing this more as the date gets closer, and will soon be working with a consultant on our Centennial campaign, which will raise funds for Garden improvements, offsite programming and increased endowment. We are grateful for neighbor support and appreciation.

SANTA BARBARA FIRE SAFE COUNCIL AND BRUSH CHIPPING

The Santa Barbara County Firesafe Council is a non-profit community benefit corporation that was founded in the 1990s after the Painted Cave Fire with the goal of bringing fire agency leaders and fire-vulnerable community leaders together to facilitate cooperative action to reduce the dangers of wildfire and increase community resilience in fire situations. Ray Smith was an early Mission Canyon representative on the Firesafe Council Board and Selden Edner is currently in that spot.

The Firesafe Council has been successful in getting grant awards and hiring full-time staff to accomplish projects and make progress in some of the following areas:

- 1. Forming, leading, and maintaining Firewise groups throughout the county (19 and counting)
- 2. Offering free home fire vulnerability assessments with a comprehensive report that gives useful tips to achieve defensible space and harden your home
- 3. Education programs
- 4. Free chipping and tag and trim programs
- 5. Herbivore fuel reduction (contracted sheep and goat grazing to thin fuels)

The chipping, tag and trim, and herbivory grazing programs are designed to improve defensible space for individual properties, clear roads of overhanging trees for evacuation safety,

FIREWISE USA COMMUNITY UPDATE

The Mission Canyon Association is so pleased to announce that there are now four communities within Mission Canyon that have enrolled in the national Firewise USA program that is locally run by the Santa Barbara Firesafe Council. The four communities include the top of Mission Canvon Road, Montrose Place, Arriba Way and parts of Upper Tunnel Road. Some participants have already been able to receive 5-10% discounts from their home insurance carrier. More importantly, the Mission Canyon Association strongly believes that participation in the Firewise Community effort will help keep Mission Canyon safer when we have the next fire. Programs like our annual chipping program can also be counted toward the required maintenance hours to maintain the Firewise USA status. and create larger reduced-fuel buffers. This summer a herd of herbivore program goats was put to work thinning brush across a 250-foot wide swath at the top of Mission Canyon - an important measure to reduce the chances of fire entering our community.

The annual free chipping program is probably the most familiar benefit of the Firesafe Council. With funding from a California State Cal-Fire grant, local tree professionals worked Mission Canyon roads and chipped and removed over 125 tons of brush this year. An additional 88 tons of brush cuttings and fibrous material were removed in the roll-off bins. Grant funds have also been made available for additional tag and trim programs along narrow



lanes/streets in Mission Canyon.

MISSION CANYON WATERSHED HEALTH AND FIRE SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS



Brian Trautwein, a long-time analyst at Santa Barbara's Environmental Defense Center, presented his extensive report on the Mission Creek Watershed Health and Fire Safety Recommendations at this year's MCA annual meeting.

The report "identifies recommendations to local, state, and federal agencies, land

managers, landowners, and nonprofit organizations regarding actions to reduce the growing wildfire threats caused by climate change and other human activities while enhancing the Mission Creek Watershed and its associated riparian woodlands and fish and wildlife habitats located in the City of Santa Barbara and unincorporated portions of Santa Barbara County."

The EDC's three main key findings include:

- 1. Measures to minimize the threat of fires, floods, and debris flows to public safety and private property by replacing invasive, flammable, nonnative plant species with native plants;
- 2. Reducing the threat of fire and impacts to the Watershed and riparian forests by protecting, respecting

and uplifting people experiencing homelessness; and

3. Protecting and restoring the natural hydrology of Mission Creek, the Watershed, and groundwater basins can lessen fire hazards and enhance Mission Creek, its tributaries, riparian and oak forests, and fist and wildlife. The Reports seven main recommendations include: (1) Replacing invasive flammable nonnative plants with native plants; (2) Reduce water extractions and increase groundwater recharge and infiltration; (3) Restore degraded habitats and protect natural habitats; (4) Transition unhoused community members to permanent housing; (5) Increase funding, equipment, and staff for defensible space inspections and wildfire response; (6) Acquire land and conservation easements in Wildland-Urban Interfaces and wildlands; and (7) Downzone properties in Wildland-Urban Interfaces and wildlands.
